


Bobcat Buzz

Spotlight on St. Mary Curriculum

The following pages include a brief summary of what is covered in different grade levels at St. Mary. For more details, please see the information sheet available outside each classroom.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

Pre-K3: Taught by degreed and certified teachers, the St. Mary Pre-K3 program offers families flexibility to enroll children in a 3-day or 5-day program offering both half- and full-day options. The students develop a foundation for reading through the "Happily Ever After" curriculum along with engaging centers and plenty of structured and unstructured play. They work on handwriting skills with the "Writing Our Faith" series, which is used move up throughout the early childhood program, sadjusting to science and lower elementary classes. Pre-K3 more independent through phonics and students attend

Pre-K4: As students move up to Pre-K4, a 5-full-days program, students focus more on adjusting to school routines and becoming more independent. The reading skills improve through phonics and sight words practiced as a group while also offering a highly individualized program through appropriate readers sent home daily when the student is ready. Math focuses on counting, patterns, and position words while the students dabble in a little science with a new "All About" unit each week focused on a wide variety of topics. Students visit several centers throughout the day to experience hands-on activities that reinforce the lessons. The children are also taught social skills, respecting others, and resolving disagreements. They learn to reverently make the sign of the cross.

Kindergarten: Students are expected to follow rules and procedures and begin completing written work as a group. Their worksheets are sent home daily along with the skills list that the students are expected to master by the end of the year. Teachers update each student's progress regularly so parents can see the progress and know what to reinforce at home. Reading continues as an individualized program, and math progresses to include counting to 100 by 1s, 5s, and 10s as well as introduction to addition and subtraction. Spelling tests begin in the third quarter. Students spend time every day in centers such as Building Blocks, Math, Art, and Reading. They also memorize the Our Father, Hail Mary, a parent's phone number, and the Pledge of Allegiance. And much, much more both academically and socially!

ELEMENTARY

First Grade: In 1st grade students work on greater independence, sit in desks instead of tables, and keep track of many of their own supplies. They continue using the "Writing Our Faith" handwriting books and have daily religion lessons. Vocabulary is a regular subject in addition to the S.T.R.E.A.M. topics. Reading fluency continues through both guided and independent reading, and the students engage in a writing workshop to develop writing skills. Math includes mastering addition and subtraction as well as word problems. Students attend music, art, PE, and technology.

Second Grade: Reading development continues for 2nd graders with both fiction and non-fiction genres. They learn grammar, spelling, phonics, vocabulary, and the writing process. Math dives deeper into more topics including time, money, measurement, algebra and geometry concepts, and more. Science Fair participation is required in 2nd grade and thereafter. Religion class includes being part of the Saints Museum and writing in Gratitude Journals. They begin cursive handwriting.

Third Grade: Students become more independent thinkers, readers, and writers at this stage. In 3rd grade they start to "read to learn" and focus on applying comprehension skills in all subject areas. Multiplication and division facts and skills are used as the basis of the expanding math curriculum. Writing, grammar, and vocabulary are taught hand-in-hand. The students engage in service projects as a class.

The academics are exactly what I expected, and I'm especially impressed with the way faith has been incorporated in the music and art classes."

Fourth Grade: This year students will work hard and play hard. Three novels are read and discussed as a class alongside grammar and vocabulary lessons. Math covers fractions, long division, decimals, and more. Science includes lots of hands-on lab work. 15 hours of service is required of students each semester. Homework is given on a nightly basis. Each student uses a binder to learn organizational skills, and they begin to learn to take notes and to study for tests.

"It's evident that the teachers truly love and care about our children. They go the extra mile to make sure our children succeed. We also really like the student to teacher ratio. We know our kids are aetting the attention they need. The academic material taught by the school is very challenging and seems to keep our children ahead of the game. Because of these things our children's academic performance is outstanding. SMCS offers a family-like community.

Fifth Grade: In this final year of elementary school, students are prepared for the transition to junior high through increased expectations regarding independence, organization, and quality of work. The class will read four novels and continue to learn grammar and vocabulary. Work is expected to be completed in readable cursive handwriting. The students receive science enrichment through STARBASE and Camp Kappe. 5th graders will learn the geography and history of the United States and perform at least 30 hours of service during the year.

JUNIOR HIGH

St. Mary junior high is taught departmentally by an experienced staff that places high expectations on the students while teaching them to develop the skills they will need to succeed in high school and beyond. Students are responsible for using RenWeb to check their assignments and view their grades. They are also expected to read the teachers' Friday Letter online. Each student is provided with an email address and is encouraged to email their teachers directly when they have questions.

Notes are taken in all academic classes, and the strategies and structure for such is taught starting in 6th grade. Homework is assigned on weeknights and weekends. Nine-weeks exams are administered in core academic classes at the end of each quarter.

At least 20 hours of service per semester is required, and a presentation related to the services performed will be made at the end of each semester. The emphasis is primarily more on individual service at this level.

Language Arts encompasses reading, advanced grammar, and vocabulary. Each class reads and analyzes multiple novels each year. Students also learn to think critically and to write organized essays.

Junior high math builds upon elementary concepts with larger numbers and more complex critical thinking. It includes introduction to pre-algebra concepts, and in 8th grade two math tracks are offered so that students who are ready to tackle Algebra have that option.

In Science the scientific method is reinforced, and science fair projects are required in the fall semester. All grades complete hands-on labs and projects.

Social Studies covers Geography, World History, Texas History, and US History over the three years. It often incorporates creative student projects.

Junior high students also receive graded instruction in Spanish. They have a weekly Technology class that teaches them to be proficient in MS Office products as well as proper usage of the Internet as a resource. Music, art, and PE round out the junior high schedule.

"We have felt very fortunate to be able to watch our children grow and thrive at St. Mary. Our oldest son is in the 6th grade this year. It has been a huge advantage for him that he be in an environment where there are clear, enforced rules about being responsible for your work, where high expectations are set for staying organized and performing well. Even more critical is that this increase in responsibility and expectations is delivered in an environment where the students know that while there are consequences for not meeting expectations, they are loved and respected. The transition to Jr. High came with an increase in workload from 5th grade to 6th grade. To our minds as parents it was not unreasonable, but it was a change that came with frustration and self doubt about being able to succeed. Watching our son push through this change and challenge has been really wonderful. He knows now that he can do hard things, in fact he can do lots of hard things! We are proud to see our son's self-confidence grow, we love to watch him enjoy the lifelong friendships he has built and we are grateful for the incredible support of the teaches and administration who take the time to understand each student so they can help them achieve their very best.


